
KIDS HBAITH ZONE

Whooping cough, also known as pertussis, is an acute contagious respiratory illness. Caused by the bacterium Bordetella pertussis, it is spread from person to person by coughing or sneezing. According to CDC, approximately 1 in 3 babies (less than 1 year of age) who contract pertussis require hospitalization.

Whooping cough cases are rapidly rising throughout the United States. During the week of November 2, 2024 (CDC Week 44) there were five times as many cases as the same week in 2023.

In Nebraska, a total of 250 confirmed and probable pertussis cases has been reported statewide since January 1, 2024.

Number of Confirmed and Probable Pertussis Cases by Month, 2024, Nebraska



Signs and symptoms:

- Early on, the symptoms are similar to most colds (runny) nose, low grade fever, mild cough).
- Loud, strong cough starts 2-3 weeks later.
- Cough may cause vomiting, difficulty breathing, and skin to turn blue.
- After paroxysm of cough (many rapid coughs in succession), the 'whoop' occurs when the child can final take a deep breath in.

Whooping Cough Disease Progression

Risk Factors: The following groups of people are at greater risk for severe pertussis including death and hospitalization:

- Children under 1 year
- Immunocompromised individuals and individuals with underlying conditions such as asthma and lung disease. Pertussis can be serious and sometimes deadly for babies and young children, especially those who have not had all their recommended pertussis vaccines.

Prevention:

- The best way to prevent whooping cough is to get vaccinated.
- Prophylactic antibiotics help prevent people exposed to pertussis from
- Practicing good hygiene help prevent the spread of pertussis and other microbes that can cause respiratory illnesses.

Pertussis complications can include:

- Apnea (Inability to breath)
- ·Pneumonia
- Convulsions (violent uncontrolled) shakings)
- Encephalopathy (disease of the brain)







THE 7 LAYERS OF PROTECTION FOR RESPIRATORY SEASON FOR STUDENTS

USING ALL THESE STEPS TOGETHER IS THE BEST WAY TO PROTECT YOURSELF, YOUR FRIENDS, AND YOUR FAMILY FROM GETTING SICK FROM VIRUSES.



Cleaner Indoor Air (Ventilation): Fresh air inside helps keep us healthy. Good ventilation means letting in more clean air to stop germs from spreading.

- · Open windows and allow fresh air in, even just a crack. Always ask first!
- · Go outside for lunch and activities such as recess and social periods.
- Dress in layers if cooler outside.



Cleaning, Sanitizing (reducing the number of germs) & Disinfecting (killing most of the germs):

- Kids should not use sanitizers and disinfectants by themselves.
- Don't forget to keep your backpack clean.
- Schools should refer to local policy or other regulations on disinfecting specific areas of the school (e.g., food service areas, bathrooms)



Hand hygiene:

- Keeping the hands clean is one of the best ways to stop germs from spreading.
- Hand sanitizers with alcohol are gentler on your skin than soap and water.
- Use lotion to keep your hands soft and healthy.



Masking:

- Masks work best when everyone wears one.
- Masks help protect kids who get sick easily, like those with asthma or other lung problems.
- · Make sure your mask is the right size and it covers your nose and mouth.



Physical distancing: Try to keep more space between yourself and others when you can.

- ✓ In line stand a few feet apart from the person in front of you.
- ✓ During lunch sit with space between friends.
- √ Walking in hallways give extra room.



Respiratory etiquette: Means how to be considerate when you cough or sneeze.

- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing and sneezing or cough into your elbow if no tissue is available.
- Throw used tissues in the trash after use and wash your hands.



Vaccines: Getting vaccinated helps stop the spread of germs and protect people who can get sicker, like:

- Grandparents over 65 years of age
- · Pregnant women
- Young children and babies

Developmental Milestones

0-1 Years

- Smiles when spoken to or smiled at, by 2 months
- · Holds head up by four months
- Reaches to grab a toy by six months
- Makes different sounds like "mamama" and "bababa" by nine months
- Walks, holding on to furniture by twelve months

1-2 Years

- Hugs stuffed doll or other toy by fifteen months
- Helps get dressed by pushing arm through sleeve by eighteen months
- Walks without holding on to anyone or anything by eighteen months
- Tries to say three or more words besides "mama" or "dada" by eighteen months
- Points to at least two body parts when asked by 2 years
- Eats with a spoon by two years

2-3 Years

- Says about 50 words by 30 months
- Jumps off the ground with both feet by 30 months
- Notices other children and joins them to play by 3 years
- · Says first name, when asked by 3 years
- Puts on some clothes, like loose pants or a jacket by 3 years
- Talks well enough for others to understand, most of the time, by 3 years

What Is Early Development Network Services Coordination?



Services Coordination means a central contact person, known as the services coordinator, is assigned to each family. Services Coordination helps families of children with special needs below age three:

- ✓ Find services to meet developmental, educational, financial, health care, child care, respite care, and other needs;
- Link with needed services
- Work with multiple providers to make sure services are provided as needed; and
- ✓ Become coordinators of services for their own children in the future.

Services Coordination Activities

- Assisting parents of eligible children in obtaining access to needed early intervention services and other services identified in the Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP);
- Making referrals to providers for needed services and scheduling appointments for eligible children and their families;
- Coordinating early intervention services and other services (such as educational, social, and medical services) for eligible children;
- Coordinating screenings (if applicable), evaluations, and assessments;
- Facilitating and participating in the development, review, and evaluation of IFSPs;
- Coordinating, facilitating, and monitoring the delivery of services to ensure that the services are provided in a timely manner;
- Informing families of their rights and procedural safeguards; and
- Facilitating the development of a transition plan to preschool or other services, if appropriate.

Who Is Eligible for Services Coordination?

Eligible families are those who have an infant or toddler below age three who qualifies for services because of a disability or developmental delay.

Year-round services coordination is provided. There is no cost to families


